From the Director's Desk: What Next?

The End of the World Part VI — Resurrection and Rapture

The patriarch Job looked up from his pain, suffering, and sorrow and asked, "If a man die, shall he live again?" (Job 14:14). Job exemplifies all of mankind with our ups and downs and alternating times of hope and despair. If this life is all there is, then "we are of all men most miserable" (1 Cor. 15:19). Thanks be to God, there is infinitely more for all who believe in and trust the Lord Jesus Christ—resurrection and return (John 3:16; Rom 10:9-10, 13).

God's Word tells of a future event when true believers will be "...caught up...to meet the Lord IN THE AIR: and so...ever be with the Lord" (1 Thes. 4:16-17). Other scriptures depict for believers a degree of happiness such as that of a bride on her wedding day. When the Lord comes (unannounced—like a thief, 1 Thes. 5:2-6) then believers asleep in the grave shall be raised and those then alive will be translated to be with the Lord forever.

The Church, caught up to be with the Lord, are those who have lived and died having received the undeserved gift of grace through faith in Jesus Christ's finished work alone and will be resurrected in incorruptibility (1 Cor. 15:51-52). Even now the Christian life in this present world is unique, the rewards are unique, and the future blessed hope is unique (Ep. 2:1-10). When this interim period of centuries of freely-flowing grace ends (when the last of God's adopted children is called, Ep. 1:4-14), God will take (as with Enoch) the "body of Christ"--the Church-to an eternal home in heaven (John 14:1-3; Rom. 12:5; 1 Cor. 12:27; Ep. 4:12; Col. 1:24).

God created Adam, the head of our race, to live forever if he obeyed. He rebelled; death and God's curse resulted (Gen. 2:17, 3:14-19). Our first parents were banished from the Garden and the Tree of Life (vs. 22-24).

God demonstrated sin's ultimate cost when He shed blood, thereby taking the life of innocent animals to make "coats of skins" (vs. 21) to be typical of the blood and the sin covering to be provided by the coming "seed of the woman," the "Lamb of God who taketh away the sin of the world" (Gen. 3:15; John 1:29; 1 Cor. 5:7; 1 Pet. 1:18-20). The blood of this innocent "Passover Lamb," applied to the doorposts of the heart, God employs to have mercy on each of His adopted children (Ex. 12:13; Matt. 26:28; Rom. 9:15-18; Heb. 9:12-14; Rev. 1:5).

God's grace appeared early in human history. God took Enoch to heaven without dying (Gen. 5:24; Heb. 11:5-6), and Noah was saved from worldwide judgment (Gen. 6:8; Heb. 11:7). With Enoch, God exemplified mortality, putting on immortality (1 Cor. 15:53-54), and Enoch prophesied of a great host of Adam's race being translated to heaven (Jude 14).

Why was Noah not translated? Scripture points out two worldwide judgments upon earth and mankind because of unrestrained rebellion and wickedness—The Flood (past) and the Great Tribulation (future, Dan. 12:1; Matt. 24:21). The Lord Jesus Christ compared Noah's flood

with the Great Tribulation (Matt. 24:37-42). So Enoch is typical of Christ's Bride being "caught up" <u>BEFORE</u> a great judgment (Flood/Tribulation) while Noah is more typical of Israel who goes through the great tribulation but loses two-thirds of its people (Zech. 13:8-9, 14:1-4; Rom. 11:26-27).

Man's transgressions have yielded death (the wages of sin) but God's mercy yields the undeserved gift of eternal life—by grace alone as with Father Abraham (Heb. 11:8-10; Rom. 4:1-5, 13-16, 19-22).

Job was also assured that one day he would have a glorified body (Job 14:14-15a) because the cost would one day be paid by his <u>REDEEMER</u>, "For I know my redeemer liveth...he shall stand at the <u>LATTER DAY</u> upon the earth: And though ...worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh I <u>shall see God...</u>" (Job 19:25-27). Zechariah and other Prophets were also appraised of Christ's return to earth (Zech. 14:4; Jer. 23:5-6; Dan. 7:9, 13-14) as was also John (Rev. 14:1).

King David also expressed his faith in life everlasting by resurrection from the dead (2 Sam. 12:22-23; Ps. 23:4-6, 86:12-13). David and the Prophets of God were given assurances by the Holy Spirit that Christ would reign over Jerusalem in a reestablished State of Israel in the last days (Ez. 34:23-24, 37:25,27).

God has promised to, one day in the future, establish Christ's kingdom with a rebuilt temple standing in Jerusalem. The time is coming when the Lord Jesus Christ will reign as King of Kings—a returning King upon a restored Davidic throne (Acts 15:15-17). While many of God's chosen Old Testament saints looked forward to Christ's coming, they also anticipated a thriving culture in Jerusalem and the nation as well as personal resurrection and redemption (Ez. 37:11-13, 21-24a; Hos. 13:14; John 11:25-26). Just as Daniel recorded for Old Testament believers a coming resurrection (Dan. 12:2), so likewise Paul wrote of the grace of life after death (2 Cor. 5:8).

Scripture alludes to Old Testament saints as not going directly to heaven at death but rather to "Abraham's Bosom" (Luke 16:22-26; Heb. 11:13). This because all sinners must first have the "covering" of Christ's perfect sacrifice before entering the realm of God's perfect holiness (Rom. 3:22-28). This "way station" was deserted once the resurrected Christ "led captivity captive" (Ep. 4:8-10) victoriously to heaven for a "better resurrection" (Heb. 11:32-35).

After Christ's resurrection and ascension, Hades is never mentioned as an abode of saints. When Paul desired "to depart" it was to be with Christ (now in heaven, Phil. 1:23) because he knew that "to be absent from the body" is to "be present with the Lord" (2 Cor. 5:6-8).

All resurrection promises in the Old Testament were necessarily centered in the coming Redeemer, otherwise their preaching and faith were vain (1 Cor. 15:13-14). Jesus declared Himself the hope of mankind because His resurrection is the center of gravity for the soul (John 11:25-26). Jesus demonstrated His power over mortality by rising in an incorruptible body (1 Cor. 15:21-23). Likewise, believer's bodies will be changed when translated to heaven as was Enoch who was "taken" before the flood judgment. Later, Elijah was taken up without seeing death (2 Kings 2:11).

Jesus, through His finished work and resurrection, made possible eternal life for all redeemed sinners—mankind's greatest news (John 14:19). Paul, by inspiration of the Holy Spirit, outlined Christ's victory (Acts 24:14-16; 1 Cor. 15:54-58) as did Peter as well (Acts 2:22-24).

The hope of every Christian who dies in the faith is the resurrection of the body and the promise of eternal life for the soul in heaven. For those alive on earth when Christ returns for HIS BRIDE, the Apostle Paul was guided to describe their future translation, "But I would not have you to be ignorant brethren, concerning them which are asleep [already dead] that ye sorrow not...if we believe Christ died and rose again, even them which sleep in Jesus will God bring with him, for...by the word of the Lord, that we which are alive...shall not prevent [go before] them which are asleep. For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: then we which are alive...shall be caught up with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air and...ever be with the Lord" (1 Thes. 4:1-18). Jesus said, "The hour is coming...when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God: and, live" (John 5:22-27). Remember, Lazarus heard Christ's voice (John 11:43-44a).

The trumpet of the Rapture heralds an event that will occur like a flash of lightning. Christians at that time will be "caught up" together with resurrected believers to live with Jesus in eternally glorified bodies (1 Cor. 15:51-52). "Wherefore comfort one another with these words" (1 Thes. 4:18) especially in times of trails and testings and let no theologian tell us these futuristic prophecies are "none of your business."

Christ's disciples asked Him when He would restore "the kingdom" (Acts 1:6-7). They well knew the Old Testament promises of the restoration of David's throne. Christ had taught them to pray for the coming of that very kingdom (Luke 11:1-2). So the Apostles most definitely maintained the truth regarding Christ's coming earthly kingdom (Acts 15:14-18).

The Bible teaches us that Jesus will reign on earth as a King (Rev. 20) which was prophesied by many Prophets including Isaiah (9:6-7; 11:1-12), Joel (3:15-17), Amos (9:11), and Zechariah (9:10, Dan. 7:14, Mic. 5:2). Greatest of all, we each have a home in the coming new heavens and new earth (Is. 65:17; 2 Pet. 3:10-14; Rev. 21:1-2).

So we are cautioned to be watchmen for "the day of the Lord so cometh as a thief in the night" (unannounced). For when they say, "Peace and safety then sudden destruction cometh...(1 Thes. 5:3). But ye brethren are <u>NOT</u> in darkness" (5:1-4).

Keep looking up.

Vote Character

Once again we are approaching an election, and Christians, like other citizens, are called to exercise their right to vote. In the past ten years, Christians have been placed under the category of value voters, meaning they hone in on issues pertaining to life, the homosexual agenda, gambling, and religious liberty amongst others. While all these issues deserve attention, the most important thing to look at is the person's character. It's true that we cannot judge a person's soul or expect perfection for we're told this cannot be achieved in Romans 3:23 – all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God. However, 1 Timothy 3:2-3 tells us that we can have reasonable standards for those in authority over us. An overseer, then, must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, temperate, prudent, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, not addicted to wine or pugnacious, but gentle peaceable, free from the love of money....

While these verses are intended for those in ecclesiastical office, I'd venture to say we can seek to apply these standards, if not others, to those seeking positions in the civil realm for the civil government is ordained by God just as the church government. In fact, Romans 13:4 tells us – for it is a minister of God to you for good. But if you do what is evil, be afraid; for it does not bear the sword for nothing; for it is a minister of God, an avenger who brings wrath on the one who practices evil. In examining this verse, it is plain to see that God meant civil government for our good as his means of administering justice. So, with this in mind, it's important to carefully examine the character of the various candidates to determine who will rule in a selfless manner and who will treat people fairly. With this in mind, it's important to consider parts in scripture that prohibit favoritism, including Deuteronomy 16:18-20, which stresses the need for civil leaders to promote justice while not showing partiality. In James 2:1-10, clear instructions are given to treat people fairly regardless of their economic standing. This is especially relevant in choosing civil leaders because public servants are constantly tempted to vote or craft policy in such a way that it will favor wealthy and influential interests, often at the expense of the people.

As previously stated, no person can fulfill the role of civil servant perfectly. However, we can assess how a person positions themselves in respect to God by their conduct, speech and, of course, their testimony. One question to ask is do they know they need God? One candidate was quoted as saying he has no need to repent, so it's obvious he doesn't see that he has a personal need for God. This is unfortunate because one might wonder who he will turn to when times get tough on the job if he gets elected. Anyone who knows anything about the presidency knows that it's one of the hardest jobs in the world. Without turning to God, I don't see how a president can survive the job and expect to be effective for the country. In terms of position, how do the candidates see themselves in relation to God as they execute the office? Referring back to Romans 13:4, we're reminded that the civil servants are God's ministers for the good of the people. Are they willing to humble themselves and submit to this role while understanding that God is their overseer?

In keeping with the duty to bear the sword, do they have a clear understanding of the civil government's purpose and how it is distinct from the roles of self, family, and church government? Those who have an understanding of law and government from a Biblical standpoint will tell you that the purpose of civil government is to punish wrong doers (bear the sword) and protect the rights of the people. It must be understood that those rights come from God, not a politician, a law professor, a Supreme Court judge or any judge, not from a policy measure or a politician. If they did come from a political leader, we'd be under tyranny because we'd be under leaders who were arrogant enough to believe they could rule without submitting to God, the ultimate lawgiver.

In terms of God being the ultimate lawgiver, we must consider the Ten Commandments which He gave to Moses on Mt. Sinai. They have influenced and have been the basis for our civil laws since our country's founding. It's the Sixth Commandment – thou shall not murder – and the Eighth Commandment – thou shall not steal – that we derive the right to life and the right to own property, respectively. Do the candidates' policy proposals and records reflect an insistence on protecting these rights?

With all of this said, as Christians we should seek to elect Christians who have a Biblical view of law and government. A Christian, because only a Christian would recognize God as Lord and Savior. Why Lord? If a person doesn't see God as Lord, they will not humble themselves to serve as His minister while they rule. Why Savior? A person who understands their utmost need for God to save them from the bondage of sin is far more likely to acknowledge their need for God as they rule. Candidates must have a Biblical view of law and government so they understand their proper role in the civil realm and don't foolishly govern in a way that they are subverting the roles in the other jurisdiction of government – self, family, and church.
